SIR: I respectfully petition you to allow me and my fellow-prisoners the freedom of the prison yard (within such boundaries as you may assign) on Sunday afternoon of each week, weather permitting, between the hours of 12.30 and 3 o'clock. In return for such permission, I, the undersigned, hereby pledge my word of honor to make no attempt to escape; to be especially observant of prison rules and regulations; and to conduct myself in all respects in a gentlemanly and orderly manner, well understanding that my own best interests are involved in maintaining model behavior. I believe that the granting of this privilege will promote general good feeling and a spirit of intelligent subordination in the Penitentiary at all times, at once lightening the duties of the officials, and increasing the willingness and diligence of the prisoners in performing their several tasks.

Please furnish this Department at once with the following information:

1. Report in regard to the conduct of Giuseppe Mouello now undergoing sentence imposed by the U. S. Court for the District of New York

2. When was he received at your institution, when will his term of imprisonment expire, with "good time" allowance, and when will he be eligible to parole under the act of June 25, 1910, as amended January 23, 1913?

3. Report in regard to the health of the prisoner: Please forward a certificate of the prison physician showing the exact state of the health of the convict, but do not incur expense therefor without express authority by the Attorney General.

4. If you have information that the prisoner is subject to re-arrest or deportation upon release, please so advise.
